2. 'Don't worry about anything; instead, pray about everything. Tell God what you need, and thank him for all he has done. Then you will experience God's peace, which exceeds anything we can understand. His peace will guard your hearts and minds as you live in Christ Jesus'. Philippians 4:6-7

3. 'I lift my eyes to the hills, from where does my help come? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth'. Psalm 121:1

So instead of just a Happy New Year, I'd like to wish you a year free from guilt and shame, a year free from all worry and anxiety, and a year spent in the ever helpful, kind and loving presence of the God who created the heavens and the earth. And to our etiquette expert I can confidently say that this wish can last all year.


